The Impact of Globalizing Economy on Local Resources

Management and Community Development for Conflict Resolution

29 (Sun) June, 2008 at Kyoto

Background and Objectives of the Seminar

The Afrasian Centre for Peace and Development Studies at Ryukoku University will hold its 2008's first international seminar on 29th June. This is a follow-up seminar after the third international symposium on 23rd and 24th of February 2008, focusing on resource and sustainability issues in developing countries of Asia and Africa.

The third international symposium invited Prof. Norman Uphoff from Cornell University as a keynote speaker who delivered the speech on "Envisioning Post-Modern Agriculture" which followed by five sessions: Session One on "Conflict over Natural resources in Asia and Africa," Session Two on "Resource Management in Comparative Historical Perspective," Session Three on "Water Resources under Stress," Session Four on "Impacts of New Technology and System on Local Food Resources," and Session Five on "Oil-based Economy under Strain." The symposium had a wide range from historical to contemporary perspectives and from global to local levels

This time, we focus on more specified subject issues, that is, the impacts of globalising economy on resource management at the local community level. The assumption in this seminar is that the local community has been maintaining their potentials to adjust their environments with utilizing their available resources and to minimize their risks in the sustainability of community development. Based on this assumption, we are expecting to have deeper academic discussion and insights to extract impacts of globalizing economy on local community resource management in Japan, other Asian and African countries. For this purpose, we invite two keynote speakers from abroad: Prof. Raymond Jussaume, Jr. from Washington State University and Prof. Louise Fortmann from University of California at Berkeley.


