The workshop consisted of three keynote addresses, 15 presentations, and sessions of animated discussion among the participants. Two of the keynote addresses were given by professors from Kyoto University. Prof. Shibata summarized the ecological characteristics of bamboo and its utilization patterns in Japan, and described recent trials of innovative uses for bamboo. Prof. Takeda highlighted bamboo's role as the fundamental base for shifting cultivation systems in Continental Southeast Asia. The papers presented in this workshop covered a very wide range of topics in bamboo science including ecology, phylogeny, cultivation, and utilization. The participants were likewise from various sectors: there were researchers, students, government staff, NGO staff and others. The workshop clearly strengthened synergy among these different sectors and contributed toward the development of an effective and modernized utilization of bamboo, which will increase the sustainability of communities and societies.

After the workshop, about 40 participants departed to Kanchanaburi province on the evening of Jan. 16; on Jan. 17, they visited a bamboo arboretum, a bamboo manufactory, and a local community specializing in bamboo production. Kanchanaburi is known as "the bamboo province" and the high diversity of natural and cultivated bamboo there is known worldwide. The participants, who had come from Thailand, Myanmar, Malaysia, India and Japan, enjoyed this glimpse into the world of bamboo cultivation and production, which deepened their understanding of the current situation of bamboo utilization, including its export and its domestic use. Participants enjoyed fruitful discussions in the field as well.


